the animal that therefore i am is the long awaited translation of the complete text of jacques derrida s ten hour address to the 1997 crisis conference entitled the autobiographical animal the third of four such colloquia on his work the book was assembled posthumously on the basis of two published sections one written and recorded session and one informal recorded session the book is at once an affectionate look back over the multiple roles played by animals in derrida s work and a profound philosophical investigation and critique of the relegation of animal life that takes place as a result of the distinction dating from descartes between man as thinking animal and every other living species that starts with the very fact of the line of separation drawn between the human and the millions of other species that are reduced to a single the animal derrida finds that distinction or versions of it surfacing in thinkers as far apart as descartes kant heidegger lacan and levinas and he dedicates extended analyses to the question in the work of each of them the book s autobiographical theme intersects with its philosophical analysis through the figures of looking and nakedness staged in terms of derrida s experience when his cat follows him into the bathroom in the morning in a classic deconstructive reversal derrida asks what this animal sees and thinks when it sees this naked man yet the experiences of nakedness and shame also lead all the way back into the mythologies of man s dominion over the beasts and trace a history of how man has systematically displaced onto the animal his own failings or betrays the animal that therefore i am is at times a militant plea and indictment regarding especially the modern industrialized treatment of animals however derrida cannot subscribe to a simplistic version of animal rights that fails to follow through in all its implications the questions and definitions of life to which he returned in much of his later work

expertise arouses fears of a society ruled by an elite of specialists in white coats or else it arouses derision because of the ineffectual bumbling of the so called experts in surpassing ourselves bereiter and scardamalia demonstrate that these stereotypes of expertise are false drawing upon the latest research in cognitive psychology they show that expertise is something other than training experience knowledge or formal qualifications many individuals acquire all these without ever becoming experts while some beginners even schoolchildren already approach problems in an expertlike fashion expertise is a process of progressive problem solving in which people continuously rethink and redefine their tasks a future expert society will not be a heaven in which all problems have disappeared but a realistic utopia in which endless problem solving will be a highly valued part of life
