as much about change as it is about stability this dynamic tension is analyzed in collective

protests intergroup dynamics language mass media science community participation art and social transitions to capitalism among other contexts these diverse cases illustrate a number of key factors that can propel slow down and retract social change an emancipatory and integrative social science is developed in this book which offers a new explanatory model of human behavior and thought under conditions of institutional and societal change

a publishers weekly best book of the year for nonfiction an essential and engaging look at recent disability history buzzfeed one of the most influential disability rights activists in us history tells her personal story of fighting for the right to receive an education have a job and just be human a story of fighting to belong in a world that wasn't built for all of us and of one woman's activism from the streets of brooklyn and san francisco to inside the halls of washington being heumann recounts judy heumann's lifelong battle to achieve respect acceptance and inclusion in society paralyzed from polio at eighteen months judy's struggle for equality began early in life from fighting to attend grade school after being described as a fire hazard to later winning a lawsuit against the new york city school system for denying her a teacher's license because of her paralysis judy's actions set a precedent that fundamentally improved rights for disabled people as a young woman judy rolled her wheelchair through the doors of the us department of health education and welfare in san francisco as a leader of the section 504 sit in the longest takeover of a governmental building in us history working with a community of over 150 disabled activists and allies judy successfully pressured the carter administration to implement protections for disabled peoples rights sparking a national movement and leading to the creation of the americans with disabilities act candid intimate and irreverent judy heumann's memoir about resistance to exclusion invites readers to imagine and make real a world in which we all belong

grassroots organizing and collective action have always been fundamental to american democracy but have been burgeoning since the 2016 election as people struggle to make

their voices heard in this moment of societal upheaval unfortunately much of that action has not had the kind of impact participants might want especially among movements representing the poor and marginalized who often have the most at stake when it comes to rights and equality yet some instances of collective action have succeeded what is the difference between a movement that wins victories for its constituents and one that fails what are the factors that make collective action powerful prisms of the people addresses those questions and more using data from six movement organizations including a coalition that organized a 104 day protest in phoenix in 2010 and another that helped restore voting rights to the formerly incarcerated in virginia hahrie han elizabeth mckenna and michelle oyakawa show that the power of successful movements most often is rooted in their ability to act as prisms of the people turning participation into political power just as prisms transform white light into rainbows understanding the organizational design choices that shape the people their leaders and their strategies can help us understand how grassroots groups achieve their goals linking strong scholarship to a deep understanding of the needs and outlook of activists prisms of the people is the perfect book for our moment for understanding what is happening and propelling it forward

the issues of poverty inequality racial justice and climate change have never been more pressing or paralyzing current approaches to social change which rely on industrial models of production and power to solve social problems are not helping in fact they are designed to entrench the status quo in the systems work of social change cynthia rayner and françois bonnici draw on two hundred years of history and a treasure trove of stories of committed social changemakers to uncover principles and practices for social change that radically depart from these approaches rather than delivering solutions these principles and practices focus on the process of change itself through rich storytelling and lucid analysis rayner and bonnici show that connection context and power sit at the heart of the change process ensuring broader agency for people and communities to create social systems that are responsive and representative in a rapidly changing world simple yet profound this book

distills a timely set of lessons for practitioners leaders scholars and policymakers

combining critical policy analysis with biographical accounts this book provides a socio historical account of the changing treatment of disabled people in britain from the 1940s to the present day it asks whether life has really changed for disabled people and shows the value of using biographical methods in new and critical ways to examine social and historical change over time

cohen offers a new framework for analyzing social projects and local social activism rather than look at how single projects are designed and managed to evaluate their impact the approach calls for analyzing fields of social action policy and politics institutional behavior social networks among policymakers and practitioners and availability of funding and other resources combined they affect the conceptualization of a social problem and the design and practice of social intervention more broadly through circumscribing the range of thinking about social problems they delimit possibilities to generate social change analyzing fields also allows for linking macro level trends in areas like policy to decision making within individual organizations and the effectiveness of projects at instigating the desired transformation in individual and collective behavior working together policymakers individual activists nonprofit organizations and staff in public institutions like schools and hospitals can critique and alter fields to challenge more effectively social problems this collaboration in turn affects how social policies are designed and ultimately the politics of social change

in recent years food studies scholarship has tended to focus on a number of increasingly abstract largely unquestioned concepts with regard to how capital markets and states organize and operate this has led to a gulf between public policy and people s realities with food as experienced in homes and on the streets through grounded case studies in seven latin american countries this book explores how development and social change in food and agriculture are fundamentally experiential contingent and unpredictable in viewing
